It's summer folks! In Foley that means rain showers to cool things off and lots of the locally grown farm produce that we all love. The Coastal Alabama Farmers and Fishermens Market is a fantastic place to visit on Saturdays. This market is one we can all be proud of. Don't forget other local farm markets, like Krupinski's. Enjoying fresh summer produce is a local tradition.

The city is working to accelerate road projects in response to growth in our area. Currently, we are fast-tracking several intersection improvements. Work on intersections along Michigan Avenue at Juniper, Cedar and Hickory is moving into the design phase. The Michigan/ Hickory intersection is a joint project between Foley and Baldwin County, as it is located in the county. We are also working closely with the county on several projects to improve crossdrainage issues. The County is studying possible improvements along the County 65 corridor from County Roads 10 to 28, which will affect north/south connectivity on the west side of the city. The city's yearly repaving schedule, which keeps our roads in good shape, is being increased from \$500,000 to \$1 million.

I get questions asking if Foley is ok after Hurricane Sally. The answer is, absolutely. It has taken a lot of work by outstanding city employees. And we are thankful for patience from our residents. We can say we are back. Foley's finances are sound. The city council learned from experience to keep adequate savings to weather storms that come our way. We continue to work with FEMA, going through the processes of working with a federal agency.

Recently, traffic lights along Hwy. 59 in Foley from County Road 28 to County Road 10 were synchronized as a part of an Alabama Department of Transportation project to

shorten the time drivers spend at red lights. Foley was one of the first to receive these updates because of our high traffic volumes. Some say they can see improvement, although we can still expect congestion during peak travel times.

After shutdowns over the past year due to COVID 19, all city facilities have reopened.

The pitcher plants are in full bloom at Graham Creek Nature Preserve.

These unique plants are carnivorous and eat insects. We are fortunate to have a park with access to these rare plants.

I invite you to take a moment to walk through our downtown and Heritage Park. The landscaping is incredible this year, thanks to the efforts of the Horticulture and Parks Departments and the work of the Beautification Committee. Downtown sidewalks have been cleaned. We continue to work closely with Foley Main Street to improve our downtown and promote the businesses in that area. Soon you will notice new signage which will help identify the Main Street area and also signage to help visitors navigate our downtown.

Lastly, we are working to implement an Impact Fee in response to the explosive growth we are experiencing. This is a fee that developers will pay that will offset the increased spending needed for infrastructure to accommodate the growth. These fees will be used to offset the pressure on our Parks and Recreation Department and also for road improvement. Over the past three years, Foley has been rated as one of the fastest growing cities in Alabama. What a dynamic place to live!

Programmable lights enhance performances



Stage performances at Foley's Civic Center may outshine previous shows thanks to a major stage lighting upgrade. The stage lights were changed from high-wattage incandescent bulbs to energy efficient multi-colored LED fixtures that can be programed, according to Pam Harris, Foley's municipal complex director. When programmed, the new light fixtures can create special effects that completely change the mood for a stage presentation. Thank you to Keith Nelson for an outstanding job working with groups to enhance individual events using the new lighting. The project was completed thanks to a \$40,000 grant received through the State Energy Program. Foley Municipal Airport receives grant

The city received a grant for \$574,797 from the Federal Aviation Administration for improvements at the Foley Municipal Airport. This funding will be used for runway and taxiway pavement maintenance which will consist of crack and joint repair, application of an FAA approved seal coat and new markings. The taxiway and connectors surface is 4,700'x35' and the runway surface is 3,700'x75'.

"Airport infrastructure impacts overall economic success, and as a result of this funding, 12 of Alabama's airports will receive the upgrades and advances needed to continue serving communities and driving development," Sen. Richard Shelby said when announcing the grants.

Ten hardcover books are selected and a question about their author must be answered to discover the "place-holder" book which can be exchanged at the Circ Desk for a hardcover copy for the patron to take home. Coffee & Donuts With an Author is an exciting program where local authors will talk about their latest publications or their writing process. These are scheduled on the last Wednesday of each month at 10 am. A Q&A session will follow each presentation and of course, coffee and donuts will be served. Working smoke alarms save lives

The Foley Fire Department reminds you to make sure your smoke alarms are operational. This means testing smoke alarms monthly and replacing batteries twice a year or when a low-battery alarm chirps. With much more time spent at home during the last year, many residents may have disabled alarms that were a "beeping nuisance". Reminder: A smoke alarm disabled because of nuisance alarms provides no protection at all.

Storm Preparedness and Safety

As we are now in another active hurricane season, the Foley Fire Department reminds you to stay alert and prepared for storm events. Please download a reliable weather app for your mobile devices or purchase a weather radio with local alerts. Also, after Hurricane Sally, many more residents purchased portable generators to use at home during extended power outages. We remind you to only use these devices in well-ventilated outdoor areas, never inside the home or closed garage. Also, working carbon monoxide detectors are important when running generator engines for extended periods of time near the home, especially during overnight hours.
