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Welcome to a New Year!

2014 is off to a good start with lots of activity in our area. Foley hosted a snowbird coffee in January. Approximately 650 of our northern friends participated in the event. I got to visit with a number of them and it was a pleasure to spend some time with them.

Sen. Richard Shelby recently toured the UTC Aerospace Systems operation in Foley. He is very supportive of their needs and was very impressed with the facility. UTC employs approximately 800 people, making it the largest manufacturing facility in Baldwin County. UTC employees are active in our community, and even have a group of volunteers who drive a Meals on Wheels route. Thanks to UTC for all they do.

In early January, I was able to attend the swearing in ceremony of our newest congressman, Rep. Bradley Byrne in Washington, D.C. While I was there I visited with his new staff, which is a blend of a few who worked for Rep. Jo Bonner and several new staffers.

Rep. Byrne has been assigned to two committees that are very important to us in the south Baldwin area - the House Armed Services Committee (Defense) and the House Natural Resources Committee (Fisheries). We look forward to working with Rep. Byrne and his staff in 2014.

We were very successful in receiving infrastructure grants in 2013. Foley was awarded almost \$30 million in grants, with a required city match of \$8 million. This is an excellent leverage of city funds to provide additional roads, as well as bike and walking paths that will improve pedestrian safety and provide a positive economic impact.

Two public hearings were conducted in January for projects that will be going to bid later

this spring. They are the Pride Drive extension, which will extend Pride Drive across Alabama 59 to Juniper Street and then connect to Baldwin County 20, and the Tiger Grant, which will help promote a more walkable city by providing additional pedestrian paths and bike lanes, improve intersections and include a pedestrian bridge over Alabama 59.

Economic activity continues to trend upward in our community. Sales,

lodging and rental taxes all are ahead of last year's record breaking numbers.

Jeff Rouzie, director of economic development, has been working hard the past few years on bringing additional retail to Foley. Hobby Lobby has announced plans to locate south of Lowes on Alabama 59. Whataburger has also purchased property near Lowes.

We welcome John Jackson, newly appointed director of the Foley library.

The Coastal Alabama Farmers and Fishermens Market continues to be very popular. Plans are under way to expand the facility by this summer. We will update this as things are firmed up.

Mark your calendars for March 22 and 23, when the Foley Caboose Club will co-sponsor a model train show at the Foley Civic Center. Visitors will see operating model train layouts in several scales from throughout the Gulf Coast area.

## Foley Police Department Honors Two Employees

Chief David Wilson recently announced the recipients of two awards to honor the top performers given annually within the Foley Police Department.

Wilson announced that Corrections Officer Gail Pettibone has been named the Public Servant Employee of the Year for 2013 for her long-term dedication and exceptional work performance. Pettibone, who has worked with the city for 16 years, is part of a 13-person corrections staff that manages Foley's 55-bed municipal jail.

Detective Corp. Glenn Hartenstein was named Police Officer of the Year for 2013. Hartenstein, a seven year veteran of the Foley Police Department, is a supervisor in the Criminal Investigations Division. Wilson praised Hartenstein's commitment and reputation as an excellent detective known for producing results. "The city has a high solve rate and Glenn is a major contributor to that," said Wilson.

Hartenstein was also the recipient of a monetary award in the amount of \$1,000 from the David and Sue Vosloh Foun-

dation, established to provide cash bonuses to recognize civil servants who serve in the most difficult jobs in our community.



The Foley Fire Department recently took delivery of a 2014 KME Custom Fire Pumper to update our fleet of fire suppression and response vehicles. This new truck is equipped with a 1500 gpm pump, LED scene lighting, and a full complement of firefighting and rescue equipment. It is assigned as a first-out engine at Fire Station #1 and is staffed 24/7. At a cost of \$380,000, this purchase has enabled us to maintain a state of the art fleet of response vehicles, giving our firefighters safer and more effective equipment to provide fire and rescue services.



Winter visitors at the Coastal Alabama Farmers and Fishermens Market have been pleasantly surprised at the variety of fresh vegetables available in Baldwin County even in the winter months, according to Heather Pritchard, market manager.

"We've had a lot of customers looking for strawberries. We will have strawberries, but due to the recent extreme cold snap, they will come in much later than usual," said Pritchard.

Some of the most popular products at the market are the fresh lettuce, double-crust pies and fresh seafood, according to Pritchard. Other items available this time of year include eggs, honey, broccoli, brussel sprouts and greens of every description.

Spring hours for the market will begin Tuesday, March 25, when the market will change from Saturdays only to Tuesdays and Fridays from 2 p.m. until 6 p.m. and Saturdays from 9 a.m. until 2 p.m.


