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Your city had a great 100th year. Foley kicked off 2015 with the centennial bell tower dedication in January. We were fortunate to have numerous events throughout the year celebrating our heritage and successes over these past 100 years. Thank you again to everyone who made the celebration such a great success.

We continue to expand bike paths, shared paths and sidewalks throughout the city. These will provide safe routes for citizens and children to enjoy our community on foot and on bikes, and also link city parks with schools. When construction is complete, we will have over 26 new miles to explore.

The Foley Dog Park will be opening in March and is looking really good. It includes a small dog area and a large dog area so all our four-legged friends have a safe place to enjoy. We also incorporated additional parking that will further improve downtown accessibility.

Work has begun on the long-awaited pedestrian bridge over Highway 59. This will enhance pedestrian safety and provide a "user friendly" connection for our downtown community. We anticipate this project will be completed by late summer or early fall.

The sports tourism complex near County Road 20 is well under way, with four of the sixteen fields sodded and more being completed each week. We had a visit from the National Intramural Recreation Sports Association in early January and were awarded their National Soccer Championship for Nov. 17 - 19 of this year. This event is expected to have a \$2.5 to \$2.8 million economic impact for our area. Great job Don Staley!

Foley Dog Park to open March 12



Area dogs and their people will soon be able to play in the Foley Dog Park, located adjacent to the Rose Trail and south of the US Post Office on US 98. Opening day is set for 10 a.m. on March 12, weather permitting, which means if the weather permits the grass to grow in. Watch the city Facebook page at Visit Foley Alabama for updates.

The park includes a fenced area divided into sections for big and small dogs. Thirty trees have been planted within the fenced area that will grow into a shaded canopy to border the open play spaces. The park includes water troughs for now, and a water feature is planned for the future. Two bronze statues welcome visitors to the park. Small canopies provide shade for benches and picnic tables. Park hours are from dawn until dusk.

A significant amount of the work was completed by city departments, which allowed the city to save approximate \$138,000 on the project.

Although completing the park has taken longer than anticipated, Foley's mayor and council believe the finished project is one residents will enjoy, and it provides another reason to bring people into the downtown area.

The Foley Dog Park was designed by architect Chad Watkins of Watkins Acy Strunk Design. The site also includes a 61-space parking area. ■



Graham Creek Park Interpretive Center to open this summer

Work is currently underway on a 5,500 square foot interpretive center at Graham Creek Nature Preserve, which is expected to open this summer. The building will include a nature center that will display local reptiles, amphibians, mammals and birds. It will also provide classroom space to expand environmental education programs. The center will be available for receptions, meetings, educational groups, reunions and events. The back patio and covered porches will provide preserve visitors a place to take a rest, enjoy a sunset or watch for wildlife.

Foley Sportsplex on Hwy. 98 grows to 10 fields

Foley is expanding its facilities for youth baseball and softball programs with a \$4 million five-field complex located next to the current five-plex on Cater Lee Way. Grand opening for the new facility is scheduled for March 19, 2016, which is opening day for the baseball/softball season. The additional fields will also increase sports tourism opportunities and support over 16 events scheduled through the remainder of this year.



New in Foley



Residents will enjoy almost 30 miles of new paths for walking and biking that are currently under construction thanks to federal grant money from the U.S. Department of Transportation's TIGER grant program. This grant is also enabling the city to build a pedestrian bridge over Highway 59. The crossover is under construction and is estimated to be completed in 180 days.



Foley will soon have another shopping venue with Ross Dress for Less expected to open this spring. The store is located just south of Academy Sports off Pride Drive.

Foley Officers' Awarded



Chief David Wilson of the Foley Police Department is pleased to announce that Officer Mike Powers have been selected as Foley PD's 2015 Police Officer of the Year and Chief Communication Officer Shirley Mosley has been selected as 2015 Public Servant of the Year. Both Power's and Mosley's selection displays their professionalism, performance and dedication to the Foley Police Department and to the citizens of Foley.

Foley saves an estimated \$3.2 million over seven years on employee health care costs

In 2008, Foley officials made the decision to fully self-insure city employee healthcare costs, which has created significant savings for the city. The self-insured plan was described by city Human Resources Director Sandra Pate. In practical terms, self-insured employers pay for each out-of-pocket claim as they are incurred instead of paying fixed premiums to an insurance carrier. Under this plan, instead of paying insurance premiums for each employee and covered dependent, the city pays 100% of the medical costs including doctor visits, medical tests, hospitalizations, etc. – all costs otherwise paid by the insurance carrier.

The city carries the self-insured health plan through Blue Cross Blue Shield who administers the plan. The city also purchases stop loss insurance which provides financial protection against catastrophic claims.

Even including these costs, the city has realized an estimated \$3.2 million in savings since the self-insured plan began in 2008. The savings are calculated annually by comparing actual medical claims expenses measured against anticipated insurance premium costs if the city had not self-insured, according to Pate.


Another health benefit for city employees that has reduced healthcare costs for the city was the opening of an employee clinic in November of 2013.

"The clinic has been very successful in helping save money on healthcare, and has also been instrumental in encouraging employees to make changes that help them to be healthier," said Foley Mayor John Koniar.

The city has realized an estimated savings of \$280,000 since the clinic opened, when comparing the average cost of a doctor's office visit to the cost of a visit to the clinic, according to Pate.
