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Newsletter

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Looking back over 2019, Foley continued to enjoy a very healthy economy with sales, lodging, rental, property and utility tax revenues rising 7.6 percent.

The city was honored to receive five top slots in Gulf Coast Media's Best in Baldwin contest:

- Best Fire Department
- Best Library
- Best Police Officer Chief David Wilson
- Best Dog Park

• Best Museum – Railroad Museum

Other positive recognitions include Foley's ranking the fourth safest city to live in Alabama by BackgroundChecks. org and the No. 6 city to live in Alabama by the Chamber of Commerce in their Best Cities to Live in America rankings.

New businesses continue to open in Foley. At OWA, new businesses include Legends in Concert live tribute shows, Paula Deen's Family Kitchen and Lucy's Retired Surfers Bar. Last year, OWA announced plans to build a \$100

million indoor water park, a 200-room hotel and a themed RV park.

Lodging-wise, a Hilton Home 2 Suites opened in June of 2019.

The Foley Main Street Program continues to work on revitalizing downtown Foley. Since the program began in June of 2018, Main Street reports a total of 22 new or relocating businesses in downtown, creating 51 net new jobs.

Foley Sports Tourism brought many visitors to our community in 2019. We held 40 indoor events bringing 6,000 volleyball players, 2,500 basketball players and 500 pickleball players from around the U.S. Outdoor events brought 14,000 soccer players, over 6,000 baseball/softball players and 2,600 archers. 2020 is shaping up to be even larger with close to 80 events already scheduled.

Graham Creek Nature Preserve continues

to be a popular destination. The Miles' Play Garden, a special play area for toddlers, was added last year. The preserve hosted 15 volunteer support days, and 76 educational programs were conducted involving more than 4,500 students.

The Foley Police Department started a new TNR (Trap, Neuter and Release) program for cats in Foley. This humane project to control the cat population was endorsed by both the police department and the city council, which donated \$4,000 for startup efforts.

The year marked the fourth year in a row that the Foley Library has been designated a Star Library by Library Journal, receiving five of five stars in our category along with only nine other libraries in the United States. This ranking also contributed to the State of Alabama's ranking as one of the top ten U.S. states with the most number of Star Libraries in various categories. The library also received a Gold Standard Award from the Alabama Library

Association, making it one of the top libraries in the state.

The Foley Senior Center continues to flourish with 720 members.

Our fire department responded to 1,650 incidents and made 9,249 community contacts and 3,428 Fire/Life Safety Inspections in FY19. A custom, half- million-dollar fire pumper is on order and expected to arrive later this year.

We are blessed to live in a wonderful community.

Foley Counts! Census 2020

State, county and city officials are working together to encourage maximum participation among Alabamians in the upcoming census count. The census provides critical data that lawmakers, business owners and others use to provide daily services, products, and support for communities. Every year, billions of dollars in federal funding go to hospitals, fire departments, schools, roads, and other resources based on census data. Census results also determine the number of seats each state will have in the U.S. House of Representatives, and they are used to draw congressional and state legislative districts.

The 2020 Census will begin March 12 when each household address receives a notification in the mail that it is time to complete the census. The form is 10 easy questions and will take about six minutes to complete. Alabamians may complete the form online, by phone or by mail.

Foley plans a census celebration on March 28 from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m. in Heritage Park. Everyone is invited to the event featuring free food, bounce houses and an animal petting zoo for children, and a meet and greet with entertainers from Legends at OWA.

Census data is confidential. Answers can only be used to produce statistics. By law, information cannot be shared with immigration enforcement agencies, law enforcement agencies or be used to determine eligibility for government benefits. ■

Foley Police Dept. offers services

The Foley Police Department has 97 employees, which includes 66 officers. The department is committed to serving the community and provides the following services.

Neighborhood Watch: The Community Services Unit trains volunteers to recognize and report suspicious activity in their community. Active involvement of residents helps reduce burglaries and other property crimes, and fosters strong relationships between citizens and police. Explorer Program: Foley Police Department Explorer Post 77 is the oldest Explorer program in the state. The program is designed to give high school students a chance to see what a career in law enforcement would be like. Explorers are allowed to ride with patrol officers and assist with traffic control at various functions such as parades, festivals, football games and the local rodeo. Contact Sgt. 

City receives grant for stormwater education

Foley's Environmental Department received a \$2,800 grant for the 2020 fiscal year from the Gulf Coast Resource Conservation and Development Council (GCRC&D) for a stormwater education project. The staff is collaborating with city Public Works and Marketing departments to create a bilingual brochure defining stormwater and highlighting its effects on natural water bodies. These printed brochures are distributed on active construction sites throughout Foley and digitally. Custom storm drain stencils have been designed and will be painted onto streets at storm drain inlets. These stenciled messages will notify community members that stormwater and any pollutants that enter those drains will be carried to Wolf Bay, Bon Secour River, or Magnolia River.

There are ways to reduce some stormwater runoff and

Environmental the Department will host a free community workshop with the support of the GCRC&D grant. On April 25th, community members can attend the workshop to learn to install rain barrels, see a demonstration of how stormwater moves through local watersheds, and participate in a Q&A session on how to mitigate the impacts. Our staff will demonstrate, through monthly and storm event

water monitoring, that this educational outreach project will have positive results for local natural water bodies and reduce the amount of pollutants being carried in stormwater runoff over the course of two years.

Foley's preemptive traffic signals benefit emergency vehicles

A year ago, the Foley Fire Department began phase one of a traffic signal preemptive system, which is equipment installed on emergency vehicles and select traffic signals. This equipment allows emergency vehicles to communicate with the traffic signal to change the light so the vehicle can get through the intersection. The system shortens response time.

Phase one included five signals and five vehicles, while phase two will add equipment for two more signals and the fire department's new pumper truck. Recently, Fire Chief Joey Darby was contacted by the city of Orange Beach about their interest in helping install two additional signals that will benefit their emergency responders.

"Orange Beach is in the transport business for EMS; they have their own ambulances and are actively transporting patients," said Darby. "Their best route to get to South Baldwin Regional Medical Center is up the Beach Express, and our Fern Avenue Extension will be their preferred route to get to the hospital."

"Orange Beach would buy the equipment, which is a little over \$3,000 per intersection for hardware, and then we would pay to add it to our system," Darby said. "There will be a little additional cost there, but it will cover our priorities down Highway 59, plus we'll be getting two more intersections. I think it's a win/ win for us; it certainly adds additional intersections with minimal costs to us; it gives them better and safer routes to travel to South Baldwin Regional Medical Center; and it keeps them off Highway 59."

During the initial installation of the system, Foley coordinated with Gulf Shores and Orange Beach and determined to purchase the same system, which have been configured to work with each other. Darby said future priorities will be lights closer to Tanger Outlets, which is a difficult spot for emergency responders. Additionally, Foley Fire Department has worked closely with city engineers to preemptively install these signals in the future each time a new signal is added. This way the system will be installed when the light goes into use.
