We've recently had several successful festivals: BBQ & Blues, Mudbugs & Margaritas, and an antique car show at OWA, just to mention a few. They reflect Foley's commitment to quality-of-life events in each season. Heritage Park Marketplace and Music and a Movie events are underway on

Fridays at Heritage Park. Bring a blanket and a chair and enjoy. We hope you enjoyed the five Midday Melodies events this spring that featured a different artist every Wednesday in Heritage Park. These events add variety to ongoing programs and attractions, like our award-winning library, the senior center, the model train exhibit and the Holmes Medical Museum. Upon completion this summer and after the Guard moves into the new facility, the City will take ownership of the old armory on N. Cypress St. We are excited about the possible uses of the facility and its central proximity to our government complex.

Two new restaurants, Mugshots Grill & Bar and Chipotle Mexican Grill, will soon begin construction between Honey Baked Ham and Moyer Ford. There are quite a few other commercial projects that will be announced soon. These will give our residents more choices in Foley and, of course, create jobs for the local economy.

Our Foley Main Street program is currently in the middle of a strategic planning process called Envisioning

the Future. They are seeking public participation for ideas and direction to make our historic Downtown Foley area even better.

Another project I would like to mention is our new Sister Cities program. Foley has joined the Sister Cities International. We are now paired with Henef, a similar city in Germany. Our goal is to pursue educational, cultural and governmental exchanges with our new sister city. Foley's public schools are participating to allow local students opportunities both in and out of the classroom.

Several projects around the city are about to begin: the Juniper Street extension, extending Juniper south across Miflin Road, then turning west to connect with Hwy. 59; turn lanes on County Road 12; the repaving of a number of downtown streets; and a TAP Grant sidewalk project along 9th Avenue and Hickory Street near the new school. Please be patient with our progress.

That sums it up for this edition. I hope you enjoy our beautiful spring season.

Foley Sports Tourism to host gymnastics championships

Foley Sports Tourism will make state sports history May 6–8 as the first Alabama city to ever host the USA Gymnastics Region 8 Xcel Championships. The competition will bring the best from Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Tennessee to the Foley Event Center. Previously the competition has been held in Atlanta, GA; Myrtle Beach, SC; and Daytona Beach, FL, putting Foley in some prestigious company. Residents can expect an estimated 1,500 gymnasts and their families.

The FST Fields will also be hosting more than 150 soccer teams from around the region the same weekend for the Big Wave Classic, drawing an estimated 8,500 visitors to Foley. The economic impact from these two events will wrap up a busy spring and set the tone for a successful summer.



Coastal Alabama Farmers and Fishermens Market awarded

The Coastal Alabama Farmers and Fishermens Market (CAFFM) recently received national attention for being named one of USA Today's 10 Best Farmers Markets in the country for the second year in a row.

This type of national recognition in consecutive years reflects the heart and soul of the market's local vendors, which make it a success. CAFFM has recently been reorganized. No longer a private non-profit, it is now a part of the city in the Leisure Services Department. The current CAFFM venue structure and leadership will remain the same. The only change will be increased support and resources from the city to help grow the market to greater heights.

What won't change is CAFFM's local farmer and fishermen vendors and the relationships they form with their customers. CAFFM operates 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. every Saturday. Residents are encouraged to come out and see what makes it one of our great nation's best markets.

Foley Public Library has a full summer of reading programs

The Foley Public Library has a full summer of reading programs planned from June to August in 2022. It's an "Ocean of Possibilities!"

Every Thursday in June the library will host a summer reading program at the Foley Civic Center at 10 a.m. These will include an onstage book read along with an entertainer. The June 2 entertainment will be Frank and Tammy's Magic Show/ Variety Show and will include some kick-off specials. On June 9, the entertainer is Wink, a unicyclist and juggler who has performed on the David Letterman show. The June 16 performer is Bruce Walstad, president of the Gulf Coast Magicians Guild. On June 23, Bright Children's Theater will perform "The Little Mermaid," a fun take on Hans Christian Anderson's classic fairy tale. The month will wrap up with fun, food and rewards on June 30 with ambassadors from the Freedom Ranch Wildlife Center. Summer Reading Programs don't end here, though!

Every Thursday in July will also feature special programs. July 7 will bring a presentation by the Pensacola

& Perdido Bays Estuary. This program will include waterrelated storytime reads as well as a touch/observation tank filled with critters found in our local waters. On July 14, a unique Real Men Read will be happening at the Civic Center with several prominent community demonstrating the fun of reading. Then on July 21, the library will host a "Slide into Summer Fun" event with EEASY Inflatables, food trucks, snow cones and prizes. This program will be from 9 a.m.-noon at a soon-to-bedisclosed location. On July 28, come to the Civic Center again at 10 a.m. for an exciting play performance directed by Logan

The last day of the summer program will be Aug. 4, 9–11 a.m., with another fun "Be a Library Explorer!" event. This will happen inside the Foley Public Library. Join your friends for prizes, book characters and a unique exploration event. Last summer's



final gathering was so popular that the same format will be used to mark the close of this season's programs.

Why move the flag?

One of the iconic scenes in Foley has been the waving of the large American flag that seemed to float over the city from its perch in a parking area near the intersection of Hwys. 59 and 98. The flag has recently been moved because the city does not own the parking lot where it was located.



A new 90-ft. flagpole has been erected in a nearby city-owned parking area on

the east side of Hwy. 59. The Beautification Committee has ordered a new, larger flag and plans additional improvements that include lighting, flowers and resurfacing the parking area.

Foley Fire Dept. announcements

The Foley Fire Department reminds you that the annual Alabama Department of Environmental Management (ADEM) Burn Ban for Baldwin County goes into effect May 1 in an effort to improve air quality. Open burning of debris is prohibited until Nov. 1 with only a few exceptions (recreational/ceremonial/cooking fires; agricultural/silvicultural burns). These exceptions may also be restricted by the fire chief via a local burn ban when drought or weather conditions make it necessary.

As we enter the summer months, we remind you to prepare for hurricane season and other severe weather events. Having a severe weather plan for your family, along with a fire escape plan, is critical to your safety. Please download a reliable weather app for your mobile devices or purchase a weather radio with local alerts. We also remind you to keep your smoke alarms in good working order and replace them after 10 years. Contact our office at 251-943-1266 for more information on these items.
